HENRY JOHNSON MILLER

Lawyer-Scholar-Teacher

Born in Americus, Georgia, Henry J. Miller moved with his family to Atlanta in time for him to attend Atlanta's Boys High School from which he graduated with honors in 1923. In 1926 Mr. Miller was awarded an A. B. degree *Magna Cum Laude* by Emory University before entering Harvard University Law School, from which he graduated with an LL.B. degree in 1929. Admitted that year to the Georgia Bar, Mr. Miller became associated with the law firm which was the predecessor to Alston & Bird, where he embarked on a distinguished legal career which continued for more than 50 years until his retirement, when he became "Of Counsel" to his firm.

During his career, Mr. Miller served as counsel to The Citizens and Southern National Bank and also as a Director of that Bank, as well as a Director of the Atlanta Gas Light Company and the American Southern Insurance Company. He has served his profession with distinction as a member of The American Law Institute, The American Judicature Society, and as a Fellow of the American College of Probate Counsel. He was Chairman of the Georgia State Board of Bar Examiners from 1966 through 1970. From 1973 to 1976, Mr. Miller was one of the three-member Committee (which included Harvard's Dean Griswold) which reviewed *amicus* briefs for the American Bar Association. In 1980, "in recognition of (his) distinguished service and contribution to the improvement of the administration of justice," Mr. Miller was designated "Amicus Curiae" of the Supreme Court of Georgia. In



1977 and 1978, he was a Visiting Professor at the Emory University Law School.

Henry J. Miller is a past Trustee of the Lovett School, The J. Bulow Campbell Foundation, and The Charles Lorigans Foundation, which he served as Chairman from 1962 to 1967.

Antonin Scalia has had a distinguished career in the judiciary, government service, and legal education. He received his A.B. degree in 1957 after attending Georgetown University and the University of Fribourg in Switzerland. In 1960 he received the LL.B. from Harvard University where he served as Note Editor of the Harvard Law Review. He remained at Harvard for the 1960-61 year while serving as a Sheldon Fellow. Justice Scalia was admitted to the Ohio Bar and was in private practice with Jones, Day, Cockley and Reavis of Cleveland, Ohio, before accepting a teaching position with the University of Virginia School of Law in 1967.

His career in legal education included service as a professor of law at the University of Virginia, a scholar in residence at the American Enterprise Institute, a visiting professor of law at Georgetown University and Stanford University, and a professor of law at the University of Chicago.

He has served the federal government as General Counsel of the Office of Telecommunications Policy, Executive Office of the President, Chairman of the Administrative Conference of the United States, and Assistant Attorney General, Office of Legal Counsel of the Department of Justice.

Justice Scalia began his judicial career with an appointment by President Reagan to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit in 1982. Subsequently, he was nominated by President Reagan to serve as an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court and took the oath of office on September 26, 1986.

Antonin Scalia is a native of New Jersey. He is married and has nine children.
